An example of a school vision/mission statement:

School Vision and Mission Statements for (Insert Your School Name)
VISION:
() School will equip students with skills needed to be successful in a global community and to prepare our students to be college and career ready.
MISSION:
() School will partner with family and community to prepare students for lifelong learning by rigorously challenging each student through the use of technology, as well as innovative and diverse teaching strategies.
DESCRIBE THE PROCESS BY WHICH THE VISION AND MISSION STATEMENTS WERE ESTABLISHED OR VALIDATED:
The school vision and mission statements were approved during the (insert Year) academic year, after obtaining input from all stakeholders. An agreement was reached to continue with our current vision and mission statements at that time. Following approval, the vision and mission statements were posted around the building and presented to a broad group of stakeholders (parents, educators, administrators, community members, business owners).

District/School Policies and Compacts

All school districts that receive Title I funds are required to have a district level policy and each school that serves children under Title I must develop a school level policy and compact for parent and family engagement. This requirement comes from Elementary and Secondary Education Act, newly revised as Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Section 1116.
